Eucharistic Revival? (www.eucharisticrevival.org) The past year was about Diocesan Revival. Starting with Corpus Christi on June 11 through July 17, 2024 will be a year (well, 13 months) of Parish Revival. This second phase is supposed to help foster greater devotion to the Eucharist and the faith on a parish Level. As Knights in our parishes and communities we are going to be called to be in the forefront.

Saint of the Month Paul the Apostle

Saul was born between 5BC and 5AD in Tarsus, Asia Minor. He was from a devout Jewish family and also born a Roman citizen. Saul was an artisan tentmaker by trade, but was also a Pharisee, from a family of Pharisees. He was educated in Jerusalem in the Jewish tradition. His early adulthood is known for his persecution of early Christians; he was present at the martyrdom of Stephen, the first Christian martyr.

Saul's dramatic conversion took place on the road to Damascus, where he saw a vision of the resurrected Jesus. The account from Acts says that "He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting'." He was blinded for three days, after which his sight was restored and he was baptized. He immediately began proclaiming Jesus as the Son of God. After his conversion, he took the name Paul (the Latin form of his Jewish name).

Paul was one of the most prolific missionaries in Christian history. He traveled through Asia Minor, southern Europe, and several times to Jerusalem preaching the Gospel especially to the Gentiles. He established numerous churches during his travels; after establishing his churches, Paul remained in communication with the faithful, often writing letters to answer questions and resolve disputes. Some of Paul's letters comprise a major part of the New Testament. Paul's writings are important because they provide good advice for how Christians should live.

Paul was criticized by Jews for his efforts to convert Jews to Christianity. He was also persecuted with other Christians by the Romans under the rule of Nero. He was imprisoned several times during his travels, finally in Rome in 67AD. This time he was beheaded by order of the Emperor Nero.

Paul has been recognized as a Saint since pre-congregation. He is often considered to be the most important person after Jesus in the history of Christianity. His feast day is on June 29 when he is honored with Saint Peter. St. Paul is the patron saint of missionaries, evangelists, writers, journalists, authors, public workers, rope and saddle makers, and tent makers.
