Remembering Those Who Have Gone Before

In our Catholic tradition, November is the time we remember those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith: family members, friends, fellow Brother Knights, and those men and women officially Canonized by the Roman Catholic Church.

The Feast of All Saints, celebrated on November 1, remembers those Saints recognized by the Church. All Souls, on November 2 remembers all souls - those who have entered heaven and those on their way to heaven. Through all of our November liturgies, we remember our deceased members:

Eternal rest, grant unto them O Lord and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. May the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Jesus and the Eucharist

The Roanoke Council will conduct a series "Jesus and the Eucharist" as part of the National Eucharistic Revival. The series will explore the story of salvation as told through Scripture, fulfilled in the death and resurrection of Jesus, and lived out in the Church and the Sacraments - especially the Eucharist. Sessions will be held each second Sunday afternoon at the council home at 1:30 for seven sessions. Doors will open at 1:00 and hors d'oeuvres will be provided.



Saint of the Month Martin of Tours


Saint Martin of Tours has been one of the most revered and loved saints in European history. Much of what we know of Martin's life is from the writings of Sulpicius Severus. Martin was born in the Roman Empire in what is now Hungary in the early 4th century and moved to northern Italy when he was young. He was born shortly after Christianity was legalized in the Roman Empire.

Martin's father was an officer in the Roman army. As a child, Martin was interested in Christianity and became a catechumen at the age of 10. At the age of 15, he was conscripted into the Roman army. He lived a virtuous life and often gave money and belongings to the poor. One day in the middle of winter, Martin came upon a poor man who was poorly dressed. All Martin had left was his military cloak, so he cut his cloak in two and gave half to the poor man. That night, Jesus appeared to Martin in a dream said to a multitude of angels: "Martin, still only a catechumen, has clothed me." He was baptized at the age of twenty and released from the military two years later.

Martin traveled to Poitiers in present-day France and stayed with Bishop (future Saint) Hillary for some time, learning the orthodox faith from him. He was also ordained a deacon and made an exorcist by Bishop Hilary. Deacon Martin later decided to return to his hometown, where he shared the Gospel and converted his mother and others in his hometown to the Christian faith.

He later returned to Poitiers and established a monastery. From there, he began preaching throughout the region and performing many miracles. He restored life to three men on separate occasions. In 371, Martin was ordained as the Bishop of Tours. As a Bishop, Martin established a system of parishes to manage his diocese. He made a point to visit each parish at least once per year. For the next twenty-six years, he traveled throughout Gaul, preaching, converting many, opposing heresies, performing miracles, and casting out demons.

Martin of Tours died in 397 and was canonized Pre-Congregation. He is considered the first great leader of Western monasticism.. Martin of Tours is the patron of the poor, soldiers, conscientious objectors, tailors, and winemakers. His feast is celebrated on November 11.
